Logo use

Each Court and the Tribunal have their own logo set:

- Federal Court of Australia
- Federal Circuit and Family Court of Australia
- National Native Title Tribunal

Some of the logos have design variations including 'stacked' and 'long'. Court logos (PDF, 872 KB)

All requests for logos should be submitted through the communications request form

The request must also include details of the proposed use of the logo.

Communications should be consulted on all external uses of any of the courts' logos.

Communications has the right to refuse use of the courts' logos, if they feel it will impact negatively on the image of the courts. Before making a request to Communications consider the implications of the courts being associated with the branded material/event.
